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What is APM PMQ?

APM PMQ training: The APM Project Management Qualification is formerly known as APMP. This is also equivalent to IPMA level D and SCQF level 7.

This course is designed to improve the skills of project management staff to enable them, through good project management practice, to make sound business decisions and thereby manage their projects to a successful conclusion. The provide examination will the delegate with an internationally recognised qualification, the PMQ is with aligned the IPMA's (International Project Management Association) qualification framework via the APM as the UK member body. The course builds on existing knowledge and experience and attendees will learn how to better plan, control and monitor their projects including risk and financial analysis together with reporting on progress. Interpersonal skills such as negotiation techniques and managing stakeholders are also covered in theory together with exercises to reinforce the learning.



As a result of the course's focus on exam preparation, the course includes a significant amount of theory delivered through plenary presentation sessions, but also includes several exercise sessions where participants are provided with example examination questions and the opportunity to review and discuss model answers.

The APM study route – an overview

APM PFQ - Project Fundamentals is an introductory certificate into the world of Project Management recommended for those with 0-2 years project experience. Developed by APM, the 'Chartered Body for Project Professionals', it is an entry level qualification from the Association for Project Management (APM). Successful candidates will have shown a good understanding of the basic tools, techniques and principles of project management through a one-hour multiple choice based examination. Holders of the certificate have demonstrated that they understand the project environment and how to work with project managers in all types of organisations.

APM PMQ (Project Management Qualification) is the next level up and recommended for those with 2-5 years experience. Delegates will learn more about how the elements of project management interact with each other and how to apply these elements practically to their own projects. Those that are already PRINCE2® Practitioner qualified can sit APM PMQ for PRINCE2® Practitioners which is a shorter exam.

What is assessed?

The PMQ, formerly known as APMP, syllabus assesses breadth of knowledge in all areas of project management and covers knowledge areas from the APM Body of Knowledge, including budgeting and cost conflict management, management, communication, earned value management, negotiation, leadership, procurement, sponsorship and teamwork.

How is it assessed?

There are two examination routes for the qualification:
A three hour paper where candidates must answer ten from sixteen questions. OR
For PRINCE2® Registered Practitioners a two hour paper that recognises prior learning. In this paper candidates must answer six from ten questions.*



How does APM PMQ fit with PRINCE2®

The answer to this question is 'perfectly' because the two approaches are very different but compliment each other. PRINCE2 is a structured method of project management. Like APM PMQ it can be applied to all industries and organization of all sizes but where it differs is in its application. The knowledge and applications of the PRINCE2 method are studied in the PRINCE2 course. It is a method where candidates are advised to manage their project in stages and by exception. I.e. meaning escalate issues when set tolerances are exceeded. For APM the approach is much more about testing a general understanding of project management as a whole.

PRINCE2® focuses on the what. It pins down a method and processes which must be followed for successful production of the projects products. APM covers this but also focuses on the people aspect of project management as part of its general best practice body of information. The answer as to whether to do PRINCE2 or APM is also a simple one. The answer is that any good project manager will be able to navigate their way around and have a good understanding of both of these approaches.



APM recognise the importance of PRINCE2® and have a specific shorter route, 'PMQ for PRINCE2 practitioners. The course allows PRINCE2 practitioners to sit a shorted exam, recognising their prior experience.
